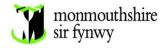

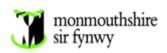



1. PURPOSE:

1.1 This report seeks Cabinet Member approval to proceed with making permanent the current experimental prohibition of driving (except for access) traffic order in place at Cross Street and Market Street, Abergavenny.

- 1.2 The Traffic Order under consideration relates to an experimental traffic order which prohibits driving along Cross Street and Market Street, Abergavenny between 10.00am and 4.00pm Monday to Saturday. The proposed Order was advertised in accordance with the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996.
- 1.3 If significant unresolved objections arise from the consultation, a public inquiry can be held to reach a decision. However, in this instance, it is considered that a public inquiry is not required and it is recommended that the proposal proceeds with the Traffic Order being made, as set out below.

2. RECOMMENDATION:

2.1 It is recommended to not hold a public inquiry, and to proceed to make the experimental order permanent, prohibiting driving along Cross Street and Market Street, Abergavenny between 10.00am and 4.00pm Monday to Saturday.

3. KEY ISSUES:

- 3.1 Originally, the prohibition of driving was introduced as part of the Covid 19 response as an emergency traffic order. At this time a number of seating pods were introduced along the length of Cross Street to allow outside seating/trading by local businesses. The traffic order also allowed pedestrians to use the space created unhindered by vehicular traffic allowing a more pleasant and safer shopping experience for visitors to Abergavenny town. Replacement (and net additional) disabled person parking bays were provided elsewhere in close proximity to the main retail streets at that time and these remain in place.
- 3.2 An 18 month Experimental Order was then introduced to continue this arrangement. An Experimental Order allows the Highways Authority to monitor the effects of changes, with an opportunity for objections or comments to be submitted during the first six months. The Council can then decide to revoke, amend or make permanent the Experimental Order.

- 3.3 The physical barriers at Cross Street with its junction with the A40 are operated by Abergavenny Town Team in accordance with the operating times of the order (10.00am 4.00pm).
- 3.4 A placemaking plan for Abergavenny is currently in progress, with a public consultation exercise anticipated to take place later in 2023/early 2024. The longer-term function of Cross Street/Market Street will be included within this exercise. The proposal subject of this report is to enable the status quo to continue between the expiration of the 18 month Experimental Order and the implementation of any proposed changes arising from the Abergavenny placemaking plan following that consultation exercise and associated adoption of that co-produced plan by MCC and Abergavenny Town Council. If the placemaking plan determines that Cross Street/Market Street needs to be reopened to traffic, the Council can revoke the Order proposed via this report. Alternative options can also be considered at that time, for example different closing times/days.
- 3.5 Elected Members, Abergavenny Town Council, businesses and members of the public had the opportunity to comment on these proposals within the first 6 months of coming into operation. No responses were received. The officer recommendation is therefore to proceed to make this Experimental Order permanent to enable the status quo to prevail pending the outcome of the placemaking plan. This decision can be reviewed and if necessary the Order revoked and/or replaced once the Abergavenny placemaking plan is adopted and the conclusions implemented.

4. EQUALITY AND FUTURE GENERATIONS EVALUATION (INCLUDES SOCIAL JUSTICE, SAFEGUARDING AND CORPORATE PARENTING):

4.1 The proposals aim to support a traffic free environment in Abergavenny town centre and improve the experience for all users, residents, businesses and visitors.

6.1 The proposals will support the traffic free environment in Abergavenny, and maintain the status quo pending the outcome of the Abergavenny placemaking plan. The Order can be revoked should the placemaking plan outcome require it.

SECTION 9 – ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 NOTICE OF MAKING AN EXPERIMENTAL ORDER

MONMOUTHSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL
(TRAFFIC REGULATION ORDER)
(CROSS STREET AND MARKET STREET, ABERGAVENNY, MONMOUTHSHIRE)
(EXPERIMENTAL) TRAFFIC ORDER 2022

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that MONMOUTHSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL in accordance with the Local Authorities Traffic Order (Procedure) (England & Wales) Regulations 1996 and the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), as amended, and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Act and of all other enabling powers and after consultation with the Chief Officer of Police, has made an Experimental Order which shall come into force on the 26th January 2022 and shall remain in force for not more than eighteen months.

The EFFECT OF THE ORDER shall be:

CROSS STREET, MARKET STREET, ABERGAVENNY

To implement a Prohibition of Driving (except for access) Order on (a) Cross Street from its junction with Lower Castle Street to its junction with Market Street and on Market Street from its junction with Cross Street to its junction with the exit from Brewery Yard car park. This Prohibition of Driving (except for access) Order shall be operative from 10 am to 4 pm, Monday to Saturday.

If made permanent, the Order shall have the effect of amending the Monmouthshire County Council (Various Roads) (Traffic Regulation and Speed Limit) Consolidation Order 2019, in that the Map Schedules specified in the First Schedule shall be amended and the Map Schedule specified in the Second Schedule to this Order shall be implemented.

A copy of the proposed Order, Maps indicating the new restrictions, together with the Statement of Reasons for proposing to make the Order, may be inspected during normal office hours at County Hall, The Rhadyr, Usk, NP15 1GA or online via the Monmouthshire County Council website www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/public-consultation-traffic/ which can also be accessed by scanning the QR code shown.

If any person wishes to question the validity of this Order or of any of its provisions on the ground that it or they are not within the powers conferred by the Act, or that any requirement of the Act or of any instrument made under the Act has not been complied with, that person may, within six weeks from the date of this notice apply for the purpose to the High Court.

The Order will come into effect on the 26th January 2022 and will remain in operation for a period of up to eighteen months. If the



provisions of the Order continue in operation for a period of at least six months, the Council will consider in due course whether the provision of the experimential Order should be continued in force indefinitely by means of a permanent Order. Any person desiring to object to the making of an Order for the purpose of such indefinite continuation may, within six months of the Order coming into operation, send a statement in writing of the objection and the grounds on which it is made to the Head of Legal and Monitoring Officer at County Hall, The Rhadyr, Usk, NP15 1GA or by email to Traffic@monmouthshire.gov.uk quoting the reference Cross Street and Market Street, Abergavenny (Experimental Traffic Order) 2022.

By virtue of Section 11 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, any person who contravenes a restriction or prohibition imposed under Sections 9 and 10 of the Act shall be guilty of an offence.


Statement of Reasons

Monmouthshire County Council propose to implement an experimental prohibition of Driving (except for access) Order on part of Cross Street and part of Market Street.

This Order is required in order to raise the level of road safety for pedestrians, other vulnerable highway users and for all other highway users of the roads within the extent of the proposed Experimental Traffic Order whilst facilitating vehicular access within a specified permitted time period only also.

The Experimental Traffic Order will enable the Council the facility to assess and review the effectiveness and the operation of this proposed Prohibition of Driving (except for access) Order.
