Age	Monmouthshire has an aging population, that is living longer with more complex health needs. Carers by definition are too within this category, therefore the strategy aims to provide a range of preventative services at the right time. Carers have identified how to meet those challenges through the 8 themes set out in the strategy.		This strategy is for all adult carers – a separate Young Carers Strategy will be developed in 2016. The strategy recognizes and makes provision for the unexpected and unplanned peaks and troughs of caring, by providing flexible respite support through a range of commissioned services ie HAFAL, Alzheimers, Age Cymru Gwent, Carers Trust and it also utilizes the carers support and information officers to undertake carers assessments. To meet the challenges of an aging population

They can also access training to understand safeguarding and how they can best ensure their caring role continues to be a safe and fulfilling one. 5. What evidence and data has informed the development of your proposal?

Since the 2001 census there has been an increase of approximately 30,000 carers in Wales with higher levels of unpaid care in Wales than in England. In 2011, more than 12% of the population in Wales were providing the same level of care that than provided in England. Monmouthshire saw the greatest percentage increase of carers in 2011 census rising by 11.2%.

Monmouthshire is the most rural county in south east Wales, with an approximate population of 91,300 people. Monmouthshire has an aging yet low teenage population, and with more planned housing developments the overall population will rise. We do not know the true number of carers in Monmouthshire, however in the 2011 Census 11,491 people in the county identified themselves as a carer. Monmouthshire's carers register currently has 900 carers (Jan 2016). Over 10 years this figure has risen by 350% ie 200 carers in 2006 to 900 carers (GAVO currently hold the carers register which is Monmouthshire's Performance Indicator for carers). With an aging population demographic in Monmouthshire the number of carers will continue to grow, presenting their own complex health needs whilst supporting those with complex health needs too.

The average age of a carer in Monmouthshire who receives respite support is 77 (monitoring information from Carers Trust & Age Cymru Gwent). The majority of the time they are supporting someone within the family. Carers are falling into the aging population category and those aged 70 plus see the greatest increase and projected increase in the number of hours of care they provide. Dementia and Alzheimers is the predominant condition that carers are providing support for. Carers are also providing support for a number of complex needs especially for those supporting someone with mental health problems.

Parent carers ie those looking after someone under the age of 18 receive less support services as a carer, as the needs of the child are supported by the Children with Disabilities Team, yet the needs of the adult cannot be supported in their entirety by the Children's team. The strategy looks to address the anomalies within the current internal configuration of services, to allow equal access for support.

The strategy is a result of consultation with carers, who agreed the 8 main themes that were of most importance to them as a carer. 900 carers were invited to the engagement event circa 70 attended, and the draft strategy has been circulated to 900 carers during the consulatation period.

In collaboration with carers and partners Monmouthshire County Council will use the key themes as their action plan. For some themes there is already work underway, for others this strategy will be the starting point. The Carers Strategy Group will work together on common and shared objectives, for other themes the Monmouthshire Carers Project will work with carers, carers groups and partner organisations. This strategy is the tool by which we can ensure the carers voice is heard to instigate change, action and improvement for the lives of carers.
