The Childcare Sufficiency Assessment (CSA) considers these barriers and looks at ways of overcoming them; this includes registering settings so that parents can claim Tax Credits.	There is a shortage of childcare available during atypical working hours such as shift workers and weekend workers. Incentives will be offered and support will be provided in order to encourage existing providers to extend their opening hours.

The CSA has highlighted that there is a significant lack of Welsh medium childcare throughout Monmouthshire and none at all in the south of the county. A target to increase this provision has been included in the action plan.

The availability of this provision is monitored through the CSA. Balancing short term need with long term and planning for the future	Childcare has been identified as a possible barrier for working parents, particularly those working atypical hours; therefore, there is a need to develop additional childcare provision to meet this need. At the same time, this needs to be balanced against flooding the market so that existing settings are no longer sustainable.	Initially, the Childcare Development Officer will work with existing providers to encourage them to expand their provision to fill this gap. They will also provide business support to settings to ensure they are sustainable.
Collaboration Working together with other partners to deliver objectives	The Early Years Development & Childcare Partnership is made up of relevant partners. Several of these partners have been involved in the completion of the Childcare Sufficiency Assessment and the EYDCP have the remit of overseeing this work and ensuring that the actions are met, where possible.	We work closely with the umbrella organisations to support our childcare settings and to develop new provision, where required. We also work closely with leisure services and members of the Play Monitoring Group to develop provision for children during school holidays and open access play provision.
Involving those with an interest and seeking their views	Parents and childcare providers completed an online questionnaire to inform the supply and demand sections of the questionnaire. Consultation was also carried out with all relevant stakeholders to ensure their views are taken into consideration.	The views of stakeholders are included within the CSA and used to inform the gap analysis and action plan. The draft CSA will be published on the MCC website for 30 days consultation prior to being submitted to Welsh Government.

- Registered childcare providers were required to complete a SASS return sent to them by CSSIW; this information was used to inform the supply section of the CSA.
- Relevant stakeholders were consulted with to ascertain their views and these have been included within the CSA.
- Census 2011 has been used for population data and statistics.
